Electrical panels and distribution boxes require adequate working and dedicated space to allow safe operation, inspection, and maintenance. The standard clearances for a single row of equipment in a corridor are typically summarized as the 36x30x78 inches rule:

- Front clearance: Minimum 3 feet (36 inches) in front of the equipment, allowing doors to open at least 90 degrees.
- Side clearance: Minimum 30 inches from the sides, or at least the width of the equipment itself.
- Height clearance: From the floor to 6 feet above the equipment or to the structural ceiling, whichever is lower . Dedicated electrical rooms or corridor-mounted panels should never be used for storage, and the path in front of the equipment must remain clear for emergency egress .

Corridor Egress and Obstruction Rules

According to the International Building Code (IBC):

- The required width of corridors must remain unobstructed. Objects such as furniture or equipment are only permissible if the minimum clear width is maintained .
 - The minimum corridor width is generally 44 inches, with exceptions for access to electrical, mechanical, or plumbing systems, which may allow narrower widths (e.g., 24 inches for equipment access), .
 - An obstruction is considered a violation only if it reduces the required egress width . Maintaining these clearances ensures that occupants can safely evacuate during emergencies and that personnel can access electrical equipment without risk .
- Practical Strategies to Prevent Obstruction
- Design Considerations: Place electrical panels in locations that do not interfere with main circulation paths or emergency exits.
 - Regular Inspections: Conduct routine checks to ensure corridors remain free of stored items, debris, or temporary barriers .
 - Signage and Awareness: Clearly mark electrical equipment and educate staff about the importance of keeping access paths clear.
 - Compliance with Codes: Follow IBC, NFPA 70 (NEC), and local regulations for both egress and electrical equipment clearances . By adhering to these standards, corridors with electrical distribution boxes remain safe, accessible, and compliant with building and fire safety codes.
